Thus, you might only hear "and I absolve you from your sins, in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit."

## Jesus Our Suffering Servant

Last week we saw foreshadowing of Jesus' Passion in Wisdom chapter 3 and even more clearly in Psalm 22. Other passages in the Old Testament do much the same. This is especially the case with the Suffering Servant Songs found in the Book of Isaiah. Specifically, these songs are found in Isaiah 42:1-4, 49:1-6, 50:4-11, and 52:13-53:12. It is not difficult at all to see Jesus in these passages. For example, the third Suffering Servant Song from chapter 50 of Isaiah reads:

"The Lord God has given me a well-trained tongue, that I might know how to answer the weary a word that will waken them. Morning after morning he wakens my ear to hear as disciples do; The Lord God opened my ear; I did not refuse, did not turn away. I gave my back to those who beat me, my cheeks to those who tore out my beard; My face I did not hide from insults and spitting. The Lord God is my help, therefore I am not disgraced; Therefore I have set my face like flint, knowing that I shall not be put to shame. He who declares my innocence is near. Who will oppose me? Let us appear together. Who will dispute my right? Let them confront me. See, the Lord God is my help; who will declare me guilty? See, they will all wear out like a garment, consumed by moths. Who among you fears the Lord, heeds his servant's voice? Whoever walk in darkness, without any light, yet trust in the name of the Lord and rely upon their God! All you who kindle flames and set flares alight, walk by the light of your own fire and by the flares you have burnt! This is your fate from my hand: you shall lie down in a place of torment."

Jesus willingly gave Himself over to abuse. Those who fear the Lord and heed the servants voice will even be guided in darkness, but those who walk by the light of their own fire will lie down in a place of torment. Reference to Jesus is even more explicit in the fourth Suffering Servant Song:

"See, my servant shall prosper, he shall be raised high and greatly exalted. Even as many were amazed at him – so marred were his features, beyond that of mortals his appearance, beyond that of human beings – so shall he startle many nations, kings shall stand speechless; For those who have not been told shall see, those who have not heard shall ponder it. Who would believe what we have heard? To whom has the arm of the Lord been revealed? He grew up like a sapling before him, like a shoot from the parched earth; He had no majestic bearing to catch our eye, no beauty to draw us to him. He was spurned and avoided by men, a man of suffering, knowing pain, like one from whom you turn your face, spurned, and we held him in no esteem. Yet it was our pain that he bore, our sufferings he endured. We thought of him as stricken, struck down by God and afflicted, But he was pierced for our sins, crushed for our iniquity. He bore the punishment that makes us whole, by his wounds we were healed. We had all gone astray like sheep, all following our own way; But the Lord laid upon him the guilt of us all. Though harshly treated, he submitted and did not open his mouth; Like a lamb led to slaughter or a sheep silent before shearers, he did not open his mouth. Seized and condemned, he was taken away. Who would have thought any more of his destiny? For he was cut off from the land of the living, struck for the sins of his people. He was given a grave among the wicked, a burial place with evildoers, though he had done no wrong, nor was deceit found in his mouth. But it was the Lord's will to crush him with pain. By making his life as a reparation offering, he shall see his offspring, shall lengthen his days, and the Lord's will shall be accomplished through him. Because of his anguish he shall see the light; because of his knowledge he shall be content; My servant, the just one, shall justify the many, their iniquity he shall bear. Therefore I will give him his portion among the many, and he shall divide the spoils with the mighty, because he surrendered himself to death, was counted among the transgressors, bore the sins of many, and interceded for the transgressors."

The parallels with this fourth Suffering Servant Song with Jesus are uncanny. He bore the punishment for our sins, He endured the suffering due our sins. He was killed for the sins of His people though He had done no wrong. Like a Lamb led to the slaughter as a reparation offering, Jesus kept His peace, and His death indeed justifies many. Amen!
